

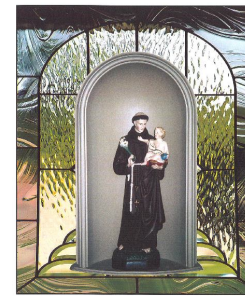

Pastor's Blog – January 2010

This month, we begin preparing some of our children to receive the Sacrament of Penance. It is one of the sacraments we can receive often along with the sacrament of Holy Eucharist. For me, the best description of the sacrament is an ancient analogy: Penance is like a second plank after baptism. I know this analogy is going back a long way, but remember the end of the movie Titanic? Kate Winslet's character is left stranded on a plank floating in the ocean after the mighty ship sank. Without that plank, she would have frozen in the frigid waters. Penance is like that plank and the frigid waters would be life without God. The sacrament of Penance is a wonderful way (a second plank) in which our souls are lifted to God. All analogies fall short, and the biggest problem with this analogy is that out on the plank you are still cold, wet, and on the open ocean. Celebrating the sacrament of penance is not like that! The burden that was there is lifted, and one is able to walk freely once again. One of the great gifts of my priesthood has been to celebrate this sacrament with people. For some, they have been estranged from the Church and God for 10 or 20 years, and a great privilege I have as a priest is to reconcile them with God and their community by saying the words of absolution, I absolve you of your sins. Many cry at this moment because something they had lost (or had thought could never be restored) is restored once again; It is a wonderful gift.

The young children preparing to receive the sacrament for the first time have likely never had such great burdens as these, but it is important for them to learn about it. Even if they never need it through life because they have never cut off that relationship with God, the Sacrament of Penance can also be used to confess less serious sins because they need to be cleared away too. There are actually four elements to the sacrament: 1 Confession, 2 Contrition, 3 Penance, and 4 Absolution. You see them in the opening canon of the section on Penance: “In the sacrament of penance the faithful who confess their sins to a legitimate minister, are sorry for them, and intend to reform themselves obtain from God through the absolution imparted by the same minister forgiveness for the sins they have committed after baptism and, at the same time, are reconciled with the Church which they have wounded by sinning” (Canon 959). If you notice, three of these things are for the person coming to the Sacrament: confessing the sins, being sorry for them, and completing the assigned penance. As a priest-confessor, I only have to do the absolution (and make sure the other three are clear and understood!).

Next week I will talk about a special case in the Sacrament of Penance called general absolution.
