Blankets for the Homeless: A year round project to make blankets for the homeless.

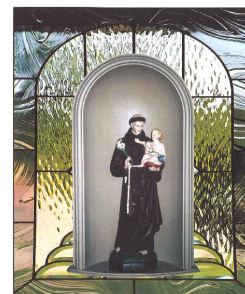
Parish Prayer Tree: Place those in need of prayer on the parish prayer tree. Call Peggy Cassidy at 252-0604

Rev. Humanitarian Aid Relief for Haiti – The diocese of Calgary is participating in the humanitarian aid relief for the earthquake victims in Haiti, launched by the Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace. All donations received by CCOOP will be sent directly to its partners on the ground in Haiti, mainly Caritas Haiti. Donations, as usual, can be made as follows:

Cheques should be made payable to the parish but clearly earmarked **“D and P Emergency Haiti”** and placed in the collection basket or mailed to the parish office. Please ensure your personal details are clearly marked so that a tax receipt can be issued. There are some ‘Special Collection Envelopes’ available on the tables at the entrance to the church.

The Federal Government will match the contributions of individuals to eligible Canadian charitable organizations in support of humanitarian and recovery efforts in response to the earthquake, up to a total of \$50 million.

Pastor's Blog – January 2010:

General Absolution – when there is just not enough time.

One image for a priest is a physician of souls. A priest helps heal a soul so that it can reach heaven. Sometimes, there are things on a soul which must be removed and the sacrament of Penance is the way to remove it!

Normally one celebrates the sacrament of penance individually. For many, it is during one of the parish penance celebrations held during Advent and Lent. Even though this is a communal penance service, we are given the time to celebrate the sacrament of Penance individually. At other times of the year, people make use of the weekly reconciliation on Saturday or will schedule an appointment with one of the priests. Here too the sacrament is celebrated individually. This is the ordinary way the sacrament is celebrated.

At times, though, it is impossible to celebrate the sacrament this way. Imagine it is a time of war, and the enemy suddenly is going to attack your area. Your local priest is at the church, but there is a great danger everyone might die, and he doesn't have time to hear everyone's confession individually. The church's solution is general absolution. It is similar to individual confession, but different in some important ways. Remember there are four elements to the sacrament: 1) Contrition, 2) Confession, 3) Absolution, and 4) Penance. The first and third are very similar. The penitent **must be sorry for their sins**, and the priest gives absolution (only this time it is to everyone at once). Confessing is quite different. Obviously, you cannot say out-loud your sins as this is not appropriate, however confessing is not dropped entirely. The penitent **must intend to confess each grave sin** within a suitable time period. The reason for this requirement goes back to the mentioned image of a priest: a physician of souls. Grave sins are those sins which cut us off from God and eternal life in heaven. Repairing that damage restores our relationship with God. The church wants this gift to be shared abundantly. Finally, there is no requirement to do a penance. Partly, this is because there would be no time to do the penance since the danger of death is immanent.

Besides times of war, there are other examples when there is a danger we could die and time is short such as in a natural disaster. No matter what, it is good to know what we must do, what our responsibilities are and for us to pray that we never have to be in such a dire situation!
