Holy Thursday: We recall Jesus’ washing of the feet, His gift of the law of love. We remember His institution of the priesthood and His gift of the Eucharist.



Good Friday: With Christians all over the world we will gather to listen to John/s record of Jesus’ passion and death. Ironically we watch as Jesus emerges not as victim but as Lord. We pray formal intercession and venerate the Cross.



Holy Saturday: A new fire is blessed, the Easter candle is lit and carried into a dark church. The story of God’s goodness is sung in the Exultet. The death of the Son gives us hope and strengthens our faith. May His resurrection give us perseverance and lead us to salvation.

Palm Sunday of the Lord’s Passion

Orientation:

On Palm Sunday (Passion Sunday) the Church enters the mystery of her crucified, buried, and risen Lord who, by his entrance into Jerusalem, gave a glimpse of his own majesty. Christians carry palm branches as a sign of the royal triumph that Christ won by his acceptance of the cross.

Reflection:

Weep not for me but for yourselves

This week each year Christians are drawn to Jerusalem, if not in body, at least in mind.

They stand at the foot of the cross, beating their breasts, and staring with pity at Jesus of Nazareth.

They listen with reverence as he prays for his killers:

‘Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do.’

But when the week is over they return to their homes to resume their deep-rooted spits and the burden of things they can’t forgive.

Let us not then weep for Jesus.

Let us weep for our own sins.

Then maybe, like Jesus, we will be able to forgive others who sin against us.

Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil punctuate our sacred time together. And if these celebrations are the punctuation marks, then our lives are the words. For just as punctuation marks help us understand and give meaning to sentences, so too do these celebrations help us understand and give meaning to our lives in these sacred days. The start of the sentence, if you will, is the procession on Holy Thursday and the period is the end is the dismissal at the Easter Vigil. Everything else in between are like commas and quotation marks, but there are no other periods throughout this time.

On Holy Thursday, we will begin mass as we usually do, but there are quotation marks in the middle. After the homily, the priest takes off his outer garment and washes feet just as Jesus did. This humbling action shows a deeper meaning of Eucharist. Just as Jesus served the apostles, we too are called to serve one another. This sacrificial love for others led Jesus to the cross.

Liturgically, this is symbolized at the end of Holy Thursday. Instead of being reposed in the tabernacle, the Eucharist is processed through the church and taken to the chapel of repose. There, people are encouraged, either at that time or later until midnight,

to wait just one hour as the apostles were encouraged at the Garden of Gethsemane. There is no final blessing or dismissal because Holy Thursday leads to Good Friday. Good Friday doesn’t really start but instead continues. There is no opening song, no procession, and no sign of the cross. The priest comes in simply and prostrates before the altar. After a time, he stands up, and the celebration continues. One of the great marks of western liturgy is noble simplicity. We do not begin again on Good Friday because we already began on Holy Thursday. The noble simplicity is that we begin once and do it well, rather than repeat it and the meaning might be lost.

Good Friday does not end with the sign of the cross or a recessional song either; there is a semicolon at best. We are left to wait just as the disciples were forced to do after Jesus died on the cross – now what, what comes next, how do we move on? Our liturgy helps us enter into the mystery of the cross.

The Easter Vigil doesn’t really begin but continues as well. People gather around the fire outside the church, and there is no sign of the cross but the liturgy of light simply starts. In the vigil there are almost too many quotation marks to name: the liturgy of light, the reading of salvation history, the blessing of the baptismal waters. It all leads to the Easter dismissal which is almost always sung: “Go in the peace of Christ, alleluia, alleluia.” To which we respond, “Thanks be to God, alleluia, alleluia.” By knowing the punctuation marks, the Triduum liturgies can begin to make more sense, and our lives, which are the words in between, can have more meaning as we enter this sacred time.
